MINUTES REGULAR CITY COUNCIL MEETING – January 5, 2023

- 1. The Mountain Home City Council met in regular session January 5th, 2023, in the Council Chambers of the Municipal Building. Mayor Hillrey Adams called the meeting to order at 6 p.m., followed by the Pledge of Allegiance and a prayer.
- 2. District Judge Jodi Carney swore in the following Council members for their 2023-2024 terms: Bob Van Haaren, Susan Stockton, Jennifer Baker, Wayne Almond, Paige Evans, Carry Manuel, Jim Bodenhamer and Nick Reed. Roger Morgan was also sworn back in as city attorney at this time.
- 3. <u>ROLL CALL</u> The following council members were present for the roll call: Bob Van Haaren, Susan Stockton, Jennifer Baker, Wayne Almond, Paige Evans, Carry Manuel, Jim Bodenhamer and Nick Reed.
- 4. <u>OFFICIALS IN ATTENDANCE</u> Mayor Hillrey Adams, City Clerk Scott Liles, Police Chief Eddie Griffin, Director of Finance and Treasury Alma Clark, Building Inspector Greg Ifland and Fire Chief Kris Quick. Media in attendance: Heather Link (KTLO) and Chris Fulton (Mountain Home Observer).
- MINUTES Council member Jennifer Baker made a motion to approve the minutes from December 15th, 2022, meeting. The motion was seconded by council member Susan Stockton. The vote was recorded as follows: All present – yes.

6. **NEW BUSINESS**

A RESOLUTION SETTING FORTH ORGANIZATION FOR THE CITY OF MOUNTAIN HOME, ARKANSAS This resolution establishes the meeting times, location, and organizational structure for City Council meetings for 2023. The vote recorded was as follows: All present – yes. The resolution was declared passed and adopted as Resolution 2023-1.

AMENDMENT TO PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENT, PROJECT No. 21W01384 This item was presented by Garver engineer Kirby Rowland and addressed the city's planned southwest sewer expansion. The vote recorded was as follows: All present – yes.

RESOLUTION OPPOSING THE SALE OF THE NABORS LANDFILL Community members Dr. Rob Connors and Steve Blumreich addressed the Council about the possible sale of the shuttered NABORS landfill, and the potential environmental impacts that were possible from the landfill's reopening. The vote recorded was as follows: All present – yes. The resolution was declared passed and adopted as Resolution 2023-2.

<u>CITY COUNCIL COMMITTEE ASSIGNMENTS</u> Council members received their committee assignments for the current two-year term. Those assignments include Wayne Almond, Bob Van Haaren, Carry Manuel and Jim Bodenhamer on the Public Safety Committee; Susan Stockton, Wayne Almond, Nick Reed and Paige Evans on the Parks & Recreation Committee; Paige Evans, Jim Bodenhamer, Jennifer Baker and Susan Stockton on the Street Committee; Jennifer Baker, Nick Reed, Bob Van Haaren and Paige Evans on the Water/Sewer Committee; and Carry Manuel, Jennifer Baker, Wayne Almond and Jim Bodenhamer on the Personnel Committee.

<u>APPOINTMENT OF TWO COUNCIL MEMBERS TO A&P COMMISSION</u> Council was also required to select two Council members to serve on the city's Advertising & Promotion Commission. Council member Jennifer Baker made the motion to appoint Bob Van Haaren and Susan Stockton to the A&P Committee, and the motion was seconded by Jim Bodenhamer. The vote recorded was as follows: All present – yes.

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING NOISE WITHIN THE CITY OF MOUNTAIN HOME The proposed ordinance was placed on its second reading. Stricken from the ordinance was the following phrase found in Section 4 (A): "Except between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 1:00 a.m., a complaint under this section must be brought by a property owner or leaseholder affected by excessive noise on their property." After some discussion, City Attorney Roger Morgan said he would add a line exempting the use of electrical generators in emergency situations, as well as their use in daily business.

<u>MAYORAL APPOINTMENT TO THE ADVERTISING & PROMOTION COMMISSION</u> Mayor Hillrey Adams announced that he would like to appoint Russell Tucker to fill the at-large seat recently vacated by Richard Hansen. Council member Bob Van Haaren made the motion to approve the appointment and was seconded by Council member Susan Stockton. The vote recorded was as follows: All present – yes.

With no further business to come before the council, Mayor Adams declared the meeting adjourned at 6:43 p.m.

- Kirby passed out copies of Garver project updates to the W/S Committee that are in progress: WWTP upgrades & additional upgrades at WWTP, New Lake intake project, Master Plan Updates.
- Kirby passed out copies of Amendment #1 Amendment to WWTP PH-2 project upgrades for \$2,006,000.00 for engineering of this project. Copy of probable construction cost is attached as well & 2 spreadsheets to show impact of additional funding needed to complete this project. This will be on council agenda January 19th, 2023 for vote of council.
- Kirby passed out copies of Amendment #2 Amendment to WTP intake project \$106,000.00 for providing updated conceptual design technical memorandum, regulatory review, environmental clearances and documentation Updates, Geotechnical Coordination. This will be on council agenda January 19th, 2023 for vote of council.

PROJECT UPDATES:

- <u>Hickory/3RD/Lillian/7th/8th</u> <u>Phase II SL PROJECT</u> Bores started on 09/27/22 and are complete on 7th & 8th streets. Our crew started laying pipe on 10/03/22 ... This phase of the project will encompass part of 7th street & 8th streets with 2 bores crossing main street; we will be laying approximately 1616' there was an error on total footage reported on this phase in the beginning- the CORRECTION is to beginning figures of 840' instead. Sewer main and replacing or adding 7 manholes on this project. Crew started on 8th street 12/05/22. A total of 840.' of pipe has been installed and 3 manholes. This job is completed.
- <u>Dver St. phase II Sewer Line Upgrade:</u> Started on 12/19/2022. Total footage to be upgraded is <u>2900</u>' of pipe and <u>21</u> manholes to be replaced. To date we have laid 350' of SDR 26 pipe and have set 3 manholes and 1 bore has been completed. Remaining to be laid is 2550' and 18 manholes.
- Sharp Annexation Sewer Line Extension Phase 3: Total footage to be laid on this project is 1800' and set 7 manholes. Contractor has completed all this job and is doing clean up only now. bid for install of materials was for \$464,551.00 City pays for materials. \$300,000 of this project is being funded by grant money from Delta Regional Authority in which the mayor Adams obtained for the department. The remaining funds are slated to be funded from Sewer Expansion. To date \$516,961.16 has been spent on this project. To date: \$259,608.07 has been reimbursed by the Delta Regional Authority on this grant. We will do 1 final pay request of with Delta Regional Authority, and all will be done. Last pay request from the contractor upon completion is for \$41,287.57 and the total bid savings was \$22,669.09 on this project. Which made the total paid to contractor only \$441,881.91.
- <u>Clysta Willet/Gregg Rd Water Line Extension:</u> Started 11/07/22. Total footage for this project was going to be 707' but we changed the footage originally decided and moved back from the original start point so the project ended up being 828' of 6" water line instead and will be laying approximately 2000' 1000' of 2" line for running inside the park where needed. To date we have completed laying all the 6" line and set one fire hydrant. We have set 1 meter and completed laying all of the 2" line inside the park on 01/09/23 for park service lines. All that is remaining to complete is dirt work, seed & strawing and hauling off extra dirt and then asphalt road back inside the park. This crew will be going to Morris St /N Church Street to water line work & will have more information at a later time on this project.

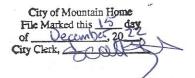

ORDINANCE NO.

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING NOISE WITHIN THE CITY OF MOUNTAIN HOME; REPEALING ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT THEREWITH; DECLARING AN EMERGENCY AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES

SECTION 1:

For the purpose of this section the following definitions shall apply unless the context clearly indicates or requires a different meaning.

Decibel (dB). A unit for measuring the volume of a sound, equal to twenty (20) times the logarithm to the base ten of the ratio of the pressure of the sound measured to the referenced pressure, which is 20 micropascals (20 micronewtons per square meter).

Emergency. Any occurrence or set of circumstances involving actual or imminent physical trauma or property damage which demands immediate action.

Emergency work. Any work performed for the purpose of preventing or alleviating the physical trauma or property damage threatened or caused by an emergency.

Gross vehicle weight rating (GVWR). The value specified by the manufacturer as the recommended maximum loaded weight of a single motor vehicle. In cases where trailers and tractors are separable, the gross combination weight rating (GCWR) which is the value specified by the manufacturer as the recommended maximum loaded weight of the combination vehicle, shall be used.

Motor carrier vehicle engaged in interstate commerce. Any vehicle for which regulations apply pursuant to Section 18 of the Federal Noise Control Act of 1972 (PL92-574), as amended, pertaining to motor carriers engaged in interstate commerce.

Noise. Any sound which annoys or disturbs humans or which causes or tends to cause an adverse psychological or physiological effect on humans.

Noise disturbance. Any sound which:

- (1) Endangers or injures the safety or health of humans or animals;
- (2) Annoys or disturbs a reasonable person of normal sensitivities; or
- (3) Endangers or injures personal or real property.

Public right-of-way. Any street, avenue, boulevard, highway, sidewalk or alley or similar place which is owned or controlled by a government entity.

Public space. Any real property or structures thereon which are owned or controlled by a governmental entity.

Sound level. The weighted sound pressure level obtained by the use of a sound level meter and frequency weighing network, such as A, B, or C as specified in the American National Standards Institute's specifications for sound level meters. If the frequency weighing employed is not indicated, the A-weighing shall apply.

Sound level meter. An instrument which includes a microphone, amplifier, RMS detector, integrator or time average, or output meter, and weighing network used to measure sound pressure levels.

Sound pressure level. Twenty (20) times the logarithm to the base ten of the ratio of the RMS sound pressure to reference pressure of 20 micropascals ($20 \times 10^{-6} \,\text{N/m}^2$).

Transient sound source. Noise, the source of which is lawn equipment, an implement of husbandry, a domestic power tool, or the repairing, rebuilding, modifying or testing of any motor vehicle or motorcycle.

SECTION 2:

- (A) Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter, and in addition thereto, it shall be unlawful for any person to make, or continue or cause or permit to be made or continued, any noise disturbance.
- (B) The provisions of this section shall not apply to:
 - (1) The emission of sound for the purpose of alerting persons to the existence of an emergency;
 - (2) The emission of sound in the performance of emergency work;
 - (3) The movement of aircraft which is in all respects conducted in accordance with, or pursuant to applicable federal laws or regulations;
 - (4) The use of bells or chimes in conjunction with places of religious worship;
 - (5) The intentional sounding or permitting the sounding of any fire, burglar or civil defense alarm, siren, whistle or similar stationary or emergency signaling device, for emergency purposes or for testing, provided such testing uses only the minimum cycle test time; and
 - (6) The use of generators as be needed to supply power in commercial or residential zones.
- (C) For the purpose of this section, the use of an amplification devise, radio, television, phonograph, drum, musical instrument or similar devise which produces, reproduces, or amplifies sound shall be deemed annoying or disturbing to a person, reasonably calculated to disturb the peace and unreasonably offensive and injurious to the public if the sound is produced between the hours of 1:00 a.m. and 8:00 a.m., and is plainly audible a distance of 150 feet or more from the source of the sound.
 - (1) Plainly audible means any sound produced as set forth above which clearly can be heard at a distance of 150 or more feet. The measurement standard shall be by the auditory senses, based on direct line of sight. Words or phrases need not be discernable and bass reverberations are included.
 - (2) This provision shall not apply to athletic or school related events.
- (D) Late Night Construction Noise Near Residences. For the purposes of this section, construction noise from private development construction activity shall be deemed annoying or disturbing to a person, reasonably calculated to disturb the peace and unreasonably offensive and injurious to the public if the sound or noise is produced later than 11:00 p.m. everyday and prior to 7:00 a.m. on all days except Sundays when the "quiet" time shall extend until 9:00 a.m. and is plainly audible at or near any residence (apartment, home, condo, etc.) within 150 yards of the construction activity.
 - (1) The measurement standard shall be by auditory senses and includes transient construction activity noise sources.
 - (2) Emergency construction activity to repair or prevent a dangerous condition in order to protect the health, safety and welfare of citizens or the workers on the development project site is exempt from this provision if authorized in advance or ratified later by the Mayor.
 - (3) This subsection takes precedence over any conflicting and less restrictive noise limitation provisions.
 - (4) A variance may be requested and granted for necessary and temporary after-hours construction activities.
- (E) Operating or causing to operate any sound amplification device on or from within any means of conveyance, whether motorized or not, so that the sound is plainly audible at a distance of 30 feet or more from the vehicle whether in a street, a highway, an alley, parking lot or driveway, whether public or private property, is prohibited and declared to be a noise disturbance in violation of this chapter.

SECTION 3:

Sound level measurements shall be made with a sound level meter Type II or better using the A-weighted scale in conformance with the standards promulgated by the American National Standards Institution.

SECTION 4:

(A) No person shall operate or cause to be operated, or permit, contract or allow to be operated on premises on public or private property any identifiable source of sound in such a manner as to create a sound level within the use districts in Table 1 below which exceeds the maximum noise levels as set forth in Table 1 as measured at any point on the boundary of the property from which the sound or noise was emanating.

All measurements shall be taken with a sound level meter in its fast or peak level setting.

- (B) *District Boundaries*. When a noise source can be identified and its noise measured in more than one use district, the noise level limits of the most restrictive use district shall apply at that district boundary.
- (C) Commercial Source. Notwithstanding the zoning classification of the underlying parcel, restaurants, night clubs, private clubs, auditoriums, dance halls, and rehearsal studios are defined as commercial sound sources existing in commercial zones for the purposes of this chapter.
- (D) *Transient Source.* For a transient sound emanating in any land use category, the peak noise level shall not exceed 20 decibels above the limit set in Table 1 above.
- (E) *Construction.* Construction projects shall be subject to the limitations specified for industrial zones for the period of time allowed by the building permit.

Section 5:

(A) No person shall operate or cause to be operated a public or private motor vehicle or motorcycle on a public right-of-way or private property at any time and in such a manner that the sound level emitted by the motor vehicle or motorcycle exceeds the level set forth in Table II below.

- (B) No person shall operate or cause to be operated any motor vehicle or motorcycle not equipped with a muffler or other sound dissipative device in good working order and in constant operation.
- (C) No person shall sound any horn or other auditory signaling device on or in any motor vehicle on any public right-of-way or public place, except as a warning of danger.
- (D) Operating or causing to operate any sound amplification device from within a vehicle so that the sound is plainly audible at a distance of 30 feet or more from the vehicle whether in a street, a highway, an alley, parking lot or driveway, whether public or private property, is prohibited and declared to be a noise disturbance in violation of this chapter.
- (E) No person shall operate or cause to be operated a motor vehicle or motorcycle by rapidly advancing its throttle (revving) such that a noise disturbance occurs.

Section 6:

It shall be unlawful for any person to use, operate or permit to be played, used or operated any radio receiving set, musical instrument, phonograph, loudspeaker, sound amplifier, or other machine or device for the producing or reproducing of sound which is cast upon the public streets from a point of origin located on private property, for the purpose of commercial advertising or attracting the attention of the public to any building or structure.

Section 7:

- (A) Application; Issuance.
 - (1) The Mayor shall have the authority to issue a permit, upon a showing of undue hardship, for a variance from the provisions of this section upon a showing by the applicant that:
 - (a) Additional time is necessary for the applicant to alter or modify his activity or operations to comply with this section; or
 - (b) The activity, operation or noise source will be of a temporary duration and cannot be done in a manner that would comply with this section; and
 - (c) No reasonable alternative is available to the applicant.
 - (2) An application for a variance permit shall be in writing on a form prescribed by the Mayor. In issuing a variance permit, the Mayor may impose reasonable conditions or requirements necessary to minimize adverse effects upon the surrounding neighborhood. For events to be attended by the public, the

written application for a variance shall be filed with the Mayor a minimum of fourteen (14) days prior to the date on which a variance is requested.

(B) Denial; Appeal. An applicant who is denied a variance by the Mayor may appeal to the City Council by filing written notice of appeal with the City Clerk within ten (10) days from the date of the Mayor's decision. The notice of appeal shall specifically state the reasons why the applicant considers the Mayor's findings and decision to be in error.

Section 8:

- (A) In lieu of issuing a notice of violation, a Code Enforcement Officer responsible for enforcement of any provision of this section may issue an order requiring abatement of any source of sound alleged to be in violation of this section within a reasonable time period. An abatement order shall not be issued when the Code Enforcement Officer has reason to believe that there will not be compliance with said order.
- (B) A violation of any provision of this section shall be cause for a notice of violation to be issued by the Code Enforcement Officer.

Section 9:

- (A) A compression release engine brake, or other hydraulically operated device that converts a power producing diesel or gas engine into a power absorbing retarding mechanism with a correspondingly increased amount of noise emission shall not be engaged or used within the city limits except in the case of failure of the service brake system, adverse weather conditions, or other emergency necessitating the compression release engine brake's use.
- (B) Fire trucks, and those municipal vehicles equipped with the Quiet Brake and Silent Partner System are exempted from the requirements of this section.

Section 10:

The violation of any provision of this chapter shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$500.00 or double that sum for each repetition of such violation. If the violation is, in its nature, continuous in respect to time, the penalty for allowing the continuation thereof shall not exceed \$250.00 for each day that the same is unlawfully continued.

Section 11:

Any and all other Ordinances, or parts thereof conflicting with this Ordinance, shall be repealed to the extent of any such conflict.

Section 12:

The regulation of noise within the City of Mountain Home is vital to the health, safety and welfare of its citizens and this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after passage.

ORDINANCE NO. 2023-

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE 2023 ADOPTED BUDGET FOR THE PURPOSE OF RECEIVING AND EXPENDING THE \$5,000 STIPEND FOR ELIGIBLE FULL-TIME LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS

WHEREAS, the Arkansas General Assembly passed Act 224 of 2022 during the 2022 Fiscal Session; WHEREAS, through passage of Act 224 of 2022, the Arkansas General Assembly appropriated \$50,000,000 to provide a one-time salary stipend for eligible full-time law enforcement officers;

WHEREAS, "eligible full-time law enforcement officer" is specifically defined under Act 224 and the city/town does not have discretion to change the definition; and

WHEREAS, each eligible full-time law enforcement officer is entitled to a one-time salary stipend of \$5,000. Employee payroll deductions will be applied as required by law; and WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Mountain Home, Arkansas has determined that the City's 2023 budget should be amended for the purpose of receiving the revenue for the onetime salary stipend funding from the State of Arkansas and expending the one-time salary stipend to eligible full-time law enforcement officers.

NOW, THEREFORE, be it ordained/resolved by the City Council, that:

Section 1. The payment for the one-time stipend will be reimbursed by DF&A as the certified officers are entered by the Chief of Police into (CLEST) which in turn verifies to the State to make the disbursements in the total amount of approximately \$26,912.50 for the stipend at \$5,000.00 each for 5 police officers that qualify & approximately \$1,912.50 in social security payments on these dollars.

The appropriation will be as follows:

GL# 101-5104-11504 = \$20,000.00 (Officer Stipend \$5,000 Each General Fund Officer)

GL# 101-5104-13700 = \$1,530.00 (Social Security Match-General fund Officers)

GL# 134-5401-11504 = \$ 5,000.00 (Officer Stipend \$5,000 Each Public Safety Officer)

GL# 134-5401-13700 = \$382.50 (Social Security Match – Public Safety Officers)

Section 2. The amount for the expenditure proposed in the amended 2022 City Budget is hereby approved by the City Council of the City/Town of Mountain Home, Arkansas and is hereby authorized and appropriated for the purposes set forth for the remainder of the Calendar year ending December 31, 2022.

APPENDIX A - SCOPE OF SERVICES

General

The scope of services includes Project Management, Alternative Intake Design Concepts Review, Updated Opinions of Project Construction Cost, Updated Conceptual Designs Technical Memorandum, Regulatory Review, Environmental Clearances and Documentation Updates, Geotechnical Coordination.

I. Project Management

A. For the Project Management task, GARVER will perform the following:

- (a) Coordination with team members.
- (b) Conduct internal reviews of deliverables to Owner.
- (c) Submit monthly invoices to the Owner.
- (d) Presentation to Owner on the results of the Intake location reviews.
- (e) Submittal of documents to the United States Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) and the Arkansas Department of Health (ADH).

II. Alternative Intake Design Concepts Review

GARVER will develop updated conceptual site layouts of: (1) a relocated shorter bridge platform style intake closer to shore; (2) a caisson style intake (shaft and micro tunnels) that is inland from the lake.

A. Updates Opinion of Probable Construction Cost

GARVER will update the opinion of probable construction costs (OPCC) for the relocated short bridge platform style intake closer to shore and a caisson style (shaft and micro tunnels) intake that is inland from the lake. Estimates will be for conceptual design consideration with an expected range of -30% to +50% of potential construction costs.

B. Updated Conceptual Designs Technical Memorandum.

Based on the information developed above, GARVER will develop an updated technical memorandum for the alternate style intakes. This update will be considered an supplement to the original Technical Memorandum.

C. Regulatory Review

GARVER will prepare and submit the Updated Conceptual Design Technical Memorandum to:

- United States Corps of Engineers (USACE).
- Arkansas Department of Health (ADH).

GARVER will respond to questions and comments from these Regulatory Agencies as a result of their review of the Technical Memorandum.

III. Environmental Clearances and Documentation

Impacts to the submitted environmental document for the two alternate site locations of the intake will be reviewed to assess any potential needed alterations to the Environmental Clearances and Documentation.



Update the Finding of No Significant Impact (FONSI) document designating the preferred alternative based upon the reviews and submit final draft for approval

IV. Geotechnical Coordination

GARVER will consult with a preferred geotechnical consultant and report in the updated Technical Memorandum on the need and cost for further geotechnical borings required to fully assess the change in site locations.

V. Project Deliverables

1.1 Garver shall provide the following Services:

General

Generally, the scope of services includes design and construction support services for the addition of an Ultraviolet Disinfection System fully enclosed in a building, improvements to the Headworks Screw Pumps, Bar Screens, Anoxic Basin Mixers, final clarifier launder covers, Scum Pump replacements, and Plant Wide Electrical to the Mountain Home Wastewater Treatment Plant. The improvement will consist of providing plans and specifications for the following work:

- Ultraviolet Disinfection
 - Remove the existing chlorination / dechlorination storage and feed equipment and gas scrubber.
 - Design the necessary changes to the existing contact chamber to allow for the tie in of the new Ultraviolet Disinfection System.
 - Design new UV disinfection facility fully enclosed within a building.
 - Design for the needed electrical equipment installation to power the Ultraviolet Disinfection System.
- Headworks Screw Pumps
 - Design for the provision of temporary bulkheads to assist in the individual removal of the existing screw pumps.
 - Install new stainless steel screw pumps.
 - Design for needed electrical equipment installation to power the new screw pumps.



Headworks Bar Screens

- Demolish the south bar screen and modify the channel for larger bar screen.
- o Install new mechanical bar screen with heated enclosure in the south channel.
- Rehabilitate the existing north mechanical bar screen with new mechanisms and heated enclosure.
- Install bar screen washer / compactor system with bagging system.

Oxidation ditch DO Measurement and De-Nitrification Analysis

- Install new DO meters
- Provide TM on current De-Nitrification capacity and potential denitrification improvements as required to meet the current discharge permit limits.

Anoxic Basin Mixers

- Demolish existing anoxic basin mixers.
- Install new anoxic basin mixers.

Final Clarifier Launder Covers

Install covers on final clarifier effluent launders.

Scum Pump Station Rehabilitation

Re-pipe and replace existing scum pumps with chopper pumps to pump clarifier scum to the aerobic digesters.

- Upgrade Oxidation Ditch operation for dissolved oxygen control with probes and electrical controls.

I. Coordination

GARVER will furnish final plans to the following agencies:

- Arkansas Department of Energy and Environment (ADEE).
- Arkansas Department of Health (ADH).

The owner will pay agency review costs outside of this contract.

GARVER will assist the Owner in the submittal of the NPDES permit modification to allow the installation of the above listed improvements and for the construction permit modification for the construction of the improvements.



GARVER will assist the Owner in coordination with ADEE and the Arkansas Department of Finance and Administration (ADFA) in applying for sales tax exemption for the wastewater treatment plan improvement equipment.

Geotechnical coordination:

• Garver will provide boring exhibit and a scope of services for Owner to hire geotechnical consultant and provide a geotechnical report for the new UV structure.

Survey Coordination:

Garver will provide a topographic survey of the proposed limits of work.

CMAR Coordination:

- Garver will assist Owner in developing Request for Proposal and selection of a qualified CMAR.
- Garver will coordinate with CMAR monthly and at major design deliverables as needed to receive cost updates from CMAR and to receive constructability reviews from the CMAR.
- The CMAR will be responsible for all Cost Estimates, providing a GMP, and bidding the work packages.

ANRC Coordination

- Garver will assist Owner in the preparation and completion of the Water and Wastewater Advisory Committee (WWAC) application for project approval and funding source recommendation.
- Garver will assist Owner in the preparation and completion of the Arkansas Department of Agriculture-Natural Resources Division (ANRC) Water Plan Compliance (WPC) application for WPC exemption.
- Garver will assist Owner in the preparation and completion of documentation to add the project to the ANRC project priority list.
- Garver will assist Owner in the preparation and completion of the ANRC funding application .
- Garver will assist Owner in the preparation and completion of the Environmental Checklist and Information Document for application of a Categorical Exclusion (CATEX).
- Garver will assist the Owner in the preparation of monthly payment requests from the ANRC loan.

II. Preliminary Design

The Preliminary Design phase submittal will include completed plans and specifications representing the project to be constructed for the Owner to review. GARVER will incorporate comments from the Owner on the Preliminary Design for inclusion into the Final Construction Documents.

III. Final Design

GARVER will conduct final designs to prepare construction plans and specifications for one construction contract, including final construction details and quantities, and special provisions.

IV. Bidding Services

During the bidding phase of the project, GARVER will:

- A. Provide construction contract documents availability to prospective bidders on the GARVER website.
- B. Support CMAR Contractor responses to questions and addenda.
- C. Participate in a pre-bid meeting if necessary.
- D. Prepare conformed construction contracts.

V. Construction Phase Services

During the construction phase of work, GARVER will accomplish the following:

- A. Issue a Notice to Proceed letter to the Contractor and attend preconstruction meeting.
- B. Attend monthly progress/coordination meetings with the Owner/Contractor.
- C. Evaluate and respond to construction material submittals and shop drawings. Corrections or



comments made by GARVER on the shop drawings during this review will not relieve Contractor from compliance with requirements of the drawings and specifications. The check will only be for review of general conformance with the design concept of the project and general compliance with the information given in the contract documents. The Contractor will be responsible for confirming and correlating all quantities and dimensions, selecting fabrication processes and techniques of construction, coordinating his work with that of all other trades, and performing his work in a safe and satisfactory manner. GARVER's review shall not constitute approval of safety precautions or constitute approval of construction means, methods, techniques, sequences, procedures, or assembly of various components. When certification of performance characteristics of materials, systems or equipment is required by the Contract Documents, either directly or implied for a complete and workable system, GARVER shall be entitled to rely upon such submittal or implied certification to establish that the materials, systems, or equipment will meet the performance criteria required by the Contract Documents.

- D. Issue instructions to the Contractor on behalf of the Owner and issue necessary clarifications (respond to RFIs) regarding the construction contract documents.
- E. Review the Contractor's progress payment requests based on the actual quantities of contract items completed and accepted and will make a recommendation to the Owner regarding payment. GARVER's recommendation for payment shall not be a representation that GARVER has made exhaustive or continuous inspections to (1) check the quality or exact quantities of the Work; (2) to review billings from Subcontractors and material suppliers to substantiate the Contractor's right to payment; or (3) to ascertain how the Contractor has used money previously paid to the Contractor.
- F. Maintain a set of working drawings and prepare and furnish record drawings.
- G. Provide full-time resident construction observation services for the 550-calendar-day construction contract performance time. The proposed fee is based on approximately 8 hours per day, 5 days per week, during the 550-calendar-day construction contract performance time. If the construction time extends beyond the time established in this agreement or if the Owner wishes to increase the time or frequency of the observation, the Owner will pay GARVER an additional fee agreed to by the Owner and GARVER.
- E. When authorized by the Owner, prepare change orders for changes in the work from that originally provided for in the construction contract documents. If redesign or substantial engineering or surveying is required in the preparation of these change order documents, the Owner will pay GARVER an additional fee to be agreed upon by the Owner and GARVER.
- F. Participate in final project inspection, prepare punch list, review final project closing documents, and submit final pay request.'

Construction observation services will be provided by GARVER's Resident Project Representative, who will provide or accomplish the following:

- A. Consult with and advise the Owner during the construction period.
- B. Coordinate with the firm providing construction materials quality assurance testing under separate contract with the Owner.
- C. Maintain a file of quantities incorporated into the work, test reports, certifications, shop drawings and submittals, and other appropriate information.
- D. Maintain a project diary which will contain information pertinent to each site visit.

In performing construction observation services, GARVER will endeavor to protect the Owner against defects and deficiencies in the work of the Contractor(s); but GARVER cannot guarantee the performance of the Contractor(s), nor be responsible for the actual supervision of construction operations or for the safety measures that the Contractor(s) takes or should take. However, if at any time during construction GARVER observes that the Contractor's work does not comply with the construction contract documents, GARVER will notify the Contractor of such non-compliance and instruct him to correct the deficiency, as appropriate for the situation. GARVER will also record the observance, the discussion, and the actions taken. If the



Contractor continues without satisfactory corrective action, GARVER will notify the Owner immediately, so that appropriate action under the Owner's contract with the Contractor can be taken.

- B. Submittals or deliverables in addition to those listed herein.
- C. Design of any utility's relocation other than water and sewer.
- D. Preparation of a Storm Water Pollution Prevention Plan (SWPPP). The construction contract documents will require the Contractor to prepare, maintain, and submit a SWPPP to ADEQ.
- E. Construction materials testing.
- F. Environmental Handling and Documentation, including wetlands identification or mitigation plans or other work related to environmentally or historically (culturally) significant items.
- G. Coordination with FEMA and preparation/submittal of a CLOMR and/or LOMR.
- H. Services after construction, such as warranty follow-up, operations support, etc.
- I. Field Surveys
- J. Geotechnical Investigations or Engineering.
- K. SCADA design and upgrades beyond those required for improvements.
- L. Preparation and submission of an Environmental Information Document.

Extra Work will be as directed by the Owner in writing for an additional fee as agreed upon by the Owner and GARVER.

- 1.2 In addition to those obligations set forth in the Agreement, Owner shall:
 - 1.2.1 Give thorough consideration to all documents and other information presented by Garver and inform Garver of all decisions within a reasonable time so as not to delay the Services.
 - 1.2.2 Make provision for the Personnel of Garver to enter public and private lands as required for Garver to perform necessary preliminary surveys and other investigations required under the applicable Work Order.
 - 1.2.3 Obtain the necessary lands, easements, and right-of-way for the construction of the work. All costs associated with securing the necessary land interests, including property acquisition and/or easement document preparation, surveys, appraisals, and abstract work, shall be borne by the Owner outside of this Agreement, except as otherwise described in the Services under Section 2.1.
 - 1.2.4 Furnish Garver such plans and records of construction and operation of existing facilities, available aerial photography, reports, surveys, or copies of the same, related to or bearing on the proposed work as may be in the possession of Owner. Such documents or data will be returned upon completion of the Services or at the request of the Owner.
 - 1.2.5 Furnish Garver a current boundary survey with easements of record plotted for the project property.
 - 1.2.6 Pay all plan review and advertising costs in connection with the project.



- 1.2.7 Provide legal, accounting, and insurance counseling services necessary for the project and such auditing services as Owner may require.
- 1.2.8 Furnish permits, permit fees, and approvals from all governmental authorities having jurisdiction over the project and others as may be necessary for completion of the project.
- 1.2.9 Furnishing Garver a current geotechnical report for the proposed site of construction. Garver will coordinate with the geotechnical consultant, Owner has contracted with, on Owner's behalf for the project specific requested information.
